SHOPPING

Harbour City

Situated in the hub of Tsim Sha Tsui, Harbour City offers a wide variety of fashion and trendy brands. What's more, flagship stores of different international famous brands are concentrated at Canton Road, providing customers with a one-stop shopping experience.



Mong Kok Area



Mongkok is officially the world's most densely populated area, the district is characterized by a mixture of old and new multi-story buildings, with shops and restaurants (including fast food) at street level and commercial or residential units above. Shops in this area sell stuff like youth clothing, jewellery, CDs, mobile phones, TV games, electronics and computer stuff etc.

Sai Yeung Choi Street South - A street full of shops selling consumer electronic products, cosmetics, and discount books, the last of which are usually located on the lower floors above ground floor of buildings.



Tung Choi Street (Ladies' Market) - This market specializes in women's clothing, accessories, cosmetics, and the like. It is open daily from noon to 00.00 a.m. at Tung Choi Street on the east of Nathan Road. Typically, where there is a market, there are also food stalls selling noodles, seafood, and congee for mid-afternoon or late-night snacks.

Fa Yuen Street (sometimes referred to *Sneakers Street*) - This is a small neighbourhood with many small retailers which sell sports equipment and clothing. It has a wide diversity of sports shoes, including many shoes of rare or special editions from different places.



BAR & DINING AREA

Knutsford Terrace

Knutsford Terrace is a strip of bars and restaurants which offer a more diverse mix of locals, expats and tourists, while still delivering plenty of choice on the bar front, meaning Knutsford has all the ingredients of a good night. One of the added bonuses of Knutsford is that almost all the establishments have an al fresco option.

Lan Kwai Fong

Lan Kwai Fong is one of Hong Kong's most popular nightlife hot spots and home to over 90 restaurants and bars. The atmosphere ranges from stylish wine pairings to raucous jelly shots and the food on offer is as diverse as the clientele.

Thanks to Hong Kong's dominance in Asian cinema, this centre of late-night revelry is so renowned that its official street sign is more photographed than many of the celebrities who haunt its clubs. Mostly, the area is crowded with people from the surrounding offices of Central, eager to shake off the working day or week. Get in the thick of it with a street side perch, or watch the antics on the road below from one of the upper floors.



Tsui Wah Restaurant
